Community Center Closure

On Tuesday, March 27th, the Community Center and Library will be closed for the day. The Utility Division Crew will be replacing the sanitary sewer line connecting the Community Center to the sewer collection system. The current line is concrete pipes that slide together every four feet. The line has become very worn and choked with roots from the surrounding trees. The new line will be a PVC product that is glued together creating a better seal that does not allow roots to enter the pipe. The new pipe will last longer, flow better, and require less maintenance.

Lane County Solid Waste Stakeholder Meeting

Councilor Burback and the Public Works & Development Director attended the Solid Waste Stakeholders meeting in Eugene. We received an update on operational changes to Lane County's Waste Management Division. They presented code changes pertaining to waste collection with Urban Growth Boundaries and the code changes confirming compliance with state Opportunity to Recycle laws. They also updated the stakeholders regarding commingled recycling. Most, if not all the small cities waste collectors, have successfully transitioned to the new recycle product list. The City of Springfield and Eugene are still making the transition. The recycled items that are collected today are much cleaner than in the past which is helping collectors find buyers for the recyclables.
