## **Youth Advisory Council**

The Cottage Grove Youth Advisory will meet on Monday, April 17th from 6:30 to 7:30 pm. The YAC will be assisting the City Manager and Public Works & Development Director in making presentation to a local scout troop about the City Emergency Operations.

## **Northwest Managers**

The City Manager attended the Northwest Regional Managers Conference this week. The conference brings together City and County managers and administrators from Oregon and Washington to learn and discuss issues and trends in local government. Major discussions surrounded the development of a 21<sup>st</sup> Century workforce, body cameras and the changes occurring at the Federal Government level and how it could impact local government.

Annually the most eventful part of the conference is the annual Oregon/Washington Volleyball Tournament. Nothing is more entertaining than watching a bunch of City Managers try to play volleyball. This year the contest was planned to be held on an outdoor sand court, but due to major heavy rains the event was cancelled. The volleyball court was covered with about 6 inches of water. Conveniently, plans were not made for a backup location.

The drugs were destroyed at no cost to the city, through a partnership with the Drug Enforcement Administration.

#### **Free Smoke Detectors and Installation**

The Red Cross Home Fire Campaign aims to reduce death and injury by installing free smoke alarms for those who need them.

The Red Cross responds to an average of two home fires every day throughout Oregon and Southwest Washington. To help save lives, the Red Cross and partners are installing free smoke alarms in homes that need them. Residents throughout Oregon and Southwest Washington can get free smoke alarms in their home by calling (503)528-5783. Appointments may also be made online. Smoke alarms have a tamper-resistant, 10-year lithium battery and are installed free of charge to residents. In Oregon this campaign is in partnership with the Oregon State Fire Marshal.

Three ways to get free smoke alarms installed by trained Red Cross volunteers Schedule an appointment for trained Red Cross volunteers to install free smoke alarms in your home, review a fire safety and home hazard checklist and provide information about creating a fire escape plan by:
