

## **DEPARTMENT STRUCTURE**

The Cottage Grove Police Department is comprised of two divisions - Operations and Administrative.

Operations Division includes Officers, Sergeants, School Resource Officer, Community Service Officer, and Chaplain.

Administrative Division includes Dispatch (South Lane 9-1-1), Records, Evidence, Investigations, and Accreditation.

### CALLS FOR SERVICE

The Cottage Grove Police Department operates the South Lane 911 Center. Cottage Grove calls for police services are dispatched through South Lane 911.

A call for service is captured when an officer is dispatched to an incident that was received from a 911 call or a result of officer initiated activity.

The following graph details the total calls for service each month during the calendar year 2023.



The Cottage Grove Police Department recorded a total of 13,957 calls for service during the 2023 calendar year.



### CASE NUMBERS BY YEAR

Not every call for service generates a police report. When it is necessary to write a police report, the report is assigned a case number. The Cottage Grove Police Department used 2,248 case numbers in 2023.

The following graph details the number of case numbers used during the past two (2) calendar years. Due to changes in internal processes and procedures, this reflects the decrease in case numbers. The decrease in case numbers is not a direct reflection of a decrease in crime.




#### NATIONAL INCIDENT-BASED REPORTING SYSTEM (NIBRS)

The Cottage Grove Police Department submits crime data to the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS) of the FBI.

NIBRS is a system used by law enforcement agencies in the United States for collecting and reporting data on crime incidents. Unlike the older Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) system, which primarily counts only the most serious offense in a given incident, NIBRS provides a more detailed and comprehensive view of crime by capturing data on each individual crime that occurs within an incident.

NIBRS collects data on various aspects of crime, including the type of offense, location, victim and offender demographics, weapons used, and relationship between victim and offender, among other details. This level of detail allows for more accurate and nuanced analysis of crime trends and patterns, as well as more targeted law enforcement strategies and resource allocation.

Through NIBRS, the Police Department reports data on each offense within 52 specific crimes identified as Group A offenses, and 10 other categories identified as Group B offenses.



#### NATIONAL INCIDENT-BASED REPORTING SYSTEM (NIBRS) CONT.

Our department uses the EIS Public Safety Software Suite for data entry, record keeping, and data analysis.

The records management system (RMS) is a key component of the EIS Public Safety Software Suite. It meets State and Federal reporting requirements effortlessly, with features like quick data collection, enhanced investigative capabilities, and a fully integrated workflow process.

On the following page you will see the data in greater detail. It may be helpful to see a few of the offense categories and compare the numbers with data collected over the past two (2) years.



#### **ARREST DETAILS**

As a result of our calls for service and investigative efforts the Cottage Grove Police Department may arrest individuals suspected of criminal behavior.

The majority of arrests made by our officers are based on probable cause developed during the course of an investigation. Some; however, are arrested when a warrant is issued by the courts.

During the calendar year 2023, the Cottage Grove Police Department was responsible for the arrest of 466 adult offenders and 30 juvenile offenders.










#### **CHILD ABUSE REPORTS**

The Cottage Grove Police Department reviews all child abuse reports that are sent in from the Oregon Department of Human Services (DHS) in addition to reports received by the police department. Each report that comes in receives a case number and an officer is assigned to investigate the allegations. The officers work closely with our local Child Protective Services case workers.

#### TRAFFIC

The mission of traffic safety is to save lives, prevent injuries, and reduce the number and severity of crashes. Our goal is to accomplish this through education, enforcement, and engineering. The Cottage Grove Police Department has applied for and received grants from ODOT to provide funding for enhanced education and enforcement to help accomplish our mission. We strive to make the roads safer for all users in Cottage Grove.





We are proud of our dispatchers' continued commitment to serving the City of Cottage Grove during our staffing shortage. We are working hard to fill the remaining vacant positions.





## **RECORDS/EVIDENCE**

The responsibilities of the Records Unit include:

- Filing and storage of police reports.
- Providing copies of reports to the public, DA's office, and other interested parties.
- Entering arrest warrants.
- Storing evidence and maintaining a "chain of custody" on all stored items.
- Releasing evidence to the public when no longer required.
- Entering and filing the required reports to various County, State & Federal agencies.
- Storing and controlling all "lost and found items."
- Organizing the yearly auction of unclaimed items.

A third party audit was conducted in early December 2023 on all evidence facilities. This was done so we can move forward with the accreditation process and to make sure we are in line with industry best practices. There were recommendation for software updates and overall procedures and processes that we are currently updating.



Above is a summary of how many pounds of prescription medications that have been dropped off into the medication drop bin. November and December had zero, due to our lobby being closed and not taking any prescriptions medication drop offs during the closure.

#### FUJI

Fuji is a two and half year old female Labrador Retriever who is our official Wellness/Comfort K-9. She was born in Mexico, but came to up from Cantina Labs in Southern California. Fuji spent a month in Scappoose Oregon with a trainer, working on obedience and earned her "Canine Good Citizen" certification. She spends most of her time in the Department playing fetch up and down the hall, laying around and begging for someone to pet her. Her primary role is to be available to officers when they have dealt with a difficult call. She also attends special events and enjoys meeting new faces. She goes home nightly with Captain Marsh.















#### K9 RIPP

The Patrol K9 Unit currently consists of one canine, "Ripp", and his handler, Officer Derek Carlton. Ripp, was donated to the department by Working Dogs Oregon, is a four year old Belgian Malinois. He was originally a patrol K9 in Pierce County Washington. Officer Carlton and Ripp were certified through OPCA on December 21st and immediately hit the ground running. On his first certified shift, Ripp was used to locate a trespass subject attempting to hide from officers.


